Premier National Junior Show included award festivities

HARRISBURG, Pa. – Family traditions run deep at the All-American Dairy Show (AADS), celebrating its 60th anniversary at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex in Harrisburg this week.

This strength was apparent during the parade of champions and honorary awards ceremonies on Monday evening, Sept. 16th at the conclusion of the Premier National Junior Show (PNJS), which saw over 1000 cattle exhibited and over 900 junior event participants across the seven breed shows, dairy judging, showmanship, fitting, and dairy herd management.

Pennsylvania Ag Secretary Russell Redding highlighted the hallmark of cow families and farm families that “have been part of this industry for a long time. It’s inspiring to note that there are next generations here to continue the traditions both in the show ring and the dairy industry. Thank you for what you do,” he said.

The poignant Obie Snider recognition awarded to Steve Cornman of Boiling Springs, Pa. marked the first time in its 20-year history that a father and son have been honored with the prestigious award. Steve’s late father Creedin received the Obie in 2005.

Steve humbly thanked those he has worked with handling the milkhouse for AADS and the state Farm Show each year.

“When I stop and think of who this award is named after, and the past recipients of this award, it is quite an honor, especially one name on that list, and I got to call him ‘Dad,’” said Steve, whose family was all present for the occasion.

Earlier in the day, Steve and his wife Debbie presented the Creedin Cornman Memorial Award for Best Bred and Owned of the Pennsylvania Junior Holstein competition to Claire Stoltzfus with her Pennwood Sidekick Pop Fly. The wooden bench was handcrafted by Steve and painted by Debbie.

The crowd was also treated to a surprise appearance by Representative Glenn G.T. Thompson (R-15th), the first U.S. House Agriculture Committee Chairman to hail from Pennsylvania in 170 years.

G.T. did the honors in presenting the Pennsylvania Dairy Hall of Fame induction award to Lolly Leshner of Way-Har Farms, Bernville, for her decades of dedicated service to the

dairy industry, its youth, and this show. She was joined by her family as well.

“I love serving this dairy industry, and especially helping the kids – like you – at different levels and I will continue to do the best I can,” said a visibly moved Leshner, who not only serves on dairy producer, promotion, and industry boards but also in public education as a Hamburg Area School District board member.

Diane Cashell was humbled with the AADS Image Award, noting that she begins thinking about the decorations each year for months in advance – in both her waking and sleeping hours, that is.

Jim Osborne, DVM announced the 2024 Arthur Nesbitt Scholarship, presented to Regan Jackson of Boyce, Virginia. She was at the show earlier but had to get back to her studies as a pre-med student with a focus on

nutrition at Louisiana State University.

“Regan feels that dairy needs more voices in the human medical field, promoting the benefits,” Osborne recounted. The 2024 scholarship was increased to \$2000 as the All-American Dairy Foundation, a 501c3 non-profit, voted to match Nesbitt’s own \$1000 in funding.

During these memorable moments, the breed show judges looked over the assembled grand champion cows, junior champion heifers, and champion bred-and-owned animals to submit their Supreme picks.

Two of the youths who were lined up with their grand champions, were brother and sister team Tyler and Madison Soden of Susquehanna, Pa.

Tyler’s 4-year-old Nisly-Gen Rager Donut-Red, the grand champion Red & White, was named supreme cow of the PNJS. She went on to be reserve grand champion of the open show the next day. Madison’s junior 3-year-old Leachland Kissed K

California judge supports farmers

HANFORD, Calif. — A judge in Kings County, California has ruled favorably for farmers in a high-stakes groundwater case.

"This is a huge deal," declared Geoff Vanden Heuvel, director of regulatory and economic affairs with Milk Producers Council.

"There have been serious questions about how the State Water Board and its staff have handled this issue," he explained. "This preliminary injunction shows that even big and powerful government bureaucracies can be held accountable."

Critics stated that the state's Water Resources Control Board exceeded its authority, operated under a web of 'underground regulations' and made unlawful demands of Kings County water managers, according to a preliminary injunction that is a near total repudiation of state actions in its attempt to reign in excessive groundwater pumping.

"Clearly, the actions of this state agency have not been transparent, are only known to SWB, and there has been no review, analysis or ability to challenge their conduct," Kings County Superior Court Judge Kathy Ciuffini wrote in the injunction issued Friday, September 13.

The ruling is part of a lawsuit brought by the Kings County Farm Bureau against the Water Board after the Board placed the region, known as the Tulare Lake subbasin, on probation at an April 16 hearing.

"Today's ruling highlights the validity of our claims and showcases our likelihood to win in court in the future," Dusty Ference, executive director of the Farm Bureau, said in a statement.

It also means a significant financial reprieve for Kings County farmers.

Probation would have meant farmers pumping 500 acre feet or more a year would have had to meter and register their wells at \$300 each, report extractions and pay \$20 per acre foot pumped. That is on top of what farmers already pay their water districts and groundwater sustainability agencies.

If deficiencies noted in the region's groundwater plan couldn't be fixed to the Water Board's satisfaction within a year, the state would establish its own pumping limits.

Those requirements are now all paused under the injunction until the trial is concluded. The next hearing is set for Jan. 10, 2025.

Farmers in other California counties face similar threats to their water supplies and are hoping for favorable decisions when it's their respective county's turn in court.

was PNJS grand champion Jersey and went on to be grand champion of the open Mid-Atlantic Jersey Show the next day.

Madison, Tyler and their mother Heather Soden and grandmother Denise Pease of Sweet Peas Holsteins and Jerseys had the honor of personal congratulations from Chairman G.T., striking up a conversation about the National Holstein Convention back in June, where G.T. was honored for Distinguished Leadership. Madison had been part of Pennsylvania's national champion dairy bowl team, where she recalled a question about farm bill legislation, to which G.T., himself, was the answer.

On that note, G.T. brought some good news from Washington on the critical 5-year farm bill.

"Progress is being made," he said, indicating the House and Senate Ag leadership from both parties all want to complete the new farm bill by the end of this year instead of doing an extension of the current legislation, so they are working through their differences

After such a big day in the ring, pageant, and beyond, the bottom-line answer was simple for these youths when asked what was most memorable:

“To be here with everybody and having the time with my family,” said Tyler.

“I just love showing my cows, and I’m glad they did well,” added Madison.

Rounding out the Supreme awards for the 2024 PNJS, the bred-and-owned honors went to Isaac Folts of North Collins, N.Y. for his Holstein milking yearling J-Folts Unix Carly-ET. She is the daughter of Isaac’s grand champion Holstein ‘Cali’ at the 2021 World Dairy Expo junior show.

The largest exhibition of Registered Jersey™ cattle in the world, the three shows of the All American, will be held November 8-11, 2024, in conjunction with the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) in Louisville, Ky.

• Brad Gavenlock of Victoria, Australia, will serve as the associate judge with Mike Berry, Powell Butte, Ore., for the All American Jersey Show on Sunday and Monday, Novem-

ber 10-11. He and his wife, Jessica, and their three girls run and operate Cherrylock Cattle Co., where they board and manage cattle for clients based all over the world. They manage regular embryo transfer and in-vitro fertilization programs for clients on-farm. In addition, they also manage and prepare cattle for shows and sales and coordinate photo days on farm.

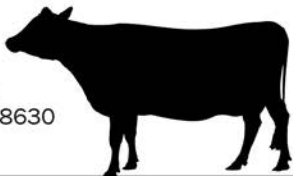

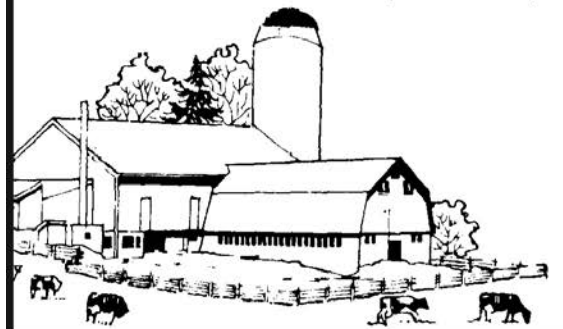

Integrated value of the U.S. genetic evaluation system to be explored

BOWIE, Md. — “The Integrated Value of the U.S. Genetic Evaluation System” will be the focus when dairy genetic enthusiasts gather on October 2, for the 10th industry meeting of the Council on Dairy Cattle Breeding (CDCB).

This annual meeting will be in Madison, Wis., on Wednesday morning during World Dairy Expo in The Tanbark, starting at 8 a.m. All dairy producers, industry professionals

provement evolves. Speakers and topics include:

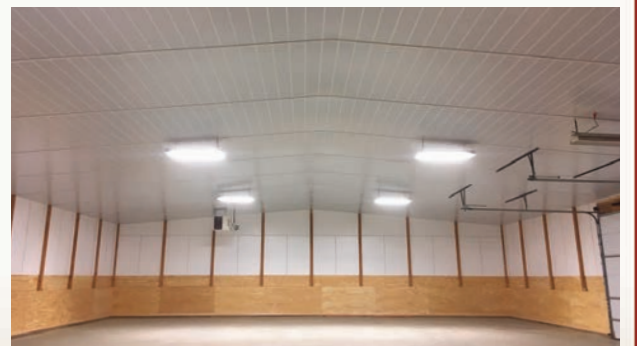

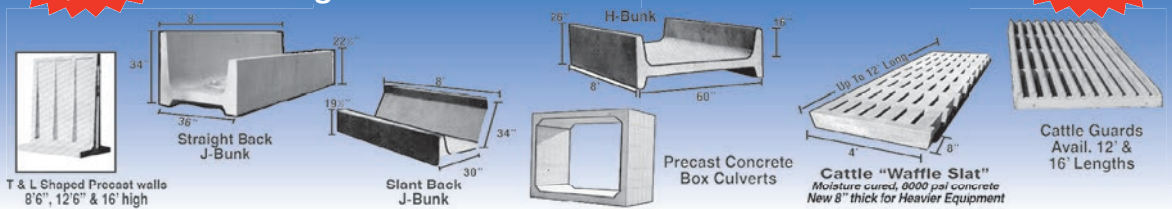

MSU professor a 'pioneer' in dairy cattle fertility management

EAST LANSING, Mich. — For more than a quarter century, Michigan State University professor J. Richard Pursley has been at the forefront of world-renowned research and dairy cattle fertility management programs that have played a pivotal role in bolstering Michigan to the sixth-largest dairy producer in the country. His work has propelled the state's \$15-billion dairy industry toward a more productive, profitable, efficient and sustainable future.

Michigan's dairy industry includes more than 1000 farms raising 440,000 cows that support nearly 40,000 jobs, both on and off the farm. The state's dairy farms produced nearly 12 billion pounds of milk in 2021.

Effective fertility synchronization and fertility management programs, like those developed by Pursley and his collaborators, have sustained and enhanced the productivity of Michigan farms and farms around the country.

Fertility management programs are designed to increase the likelihood that cows become pregnant during first artificial insemination (AI). This allows farms to:

- House fewer animals while maintaining high production rates.
- Maintain high fertility rates among the herd.
- Reduce health issues after calving.
- Maintain greater average milk production from their herds.

"Dr. Pursley is one of the pioneers of fertility synchronization programs. There's not a herd that we work with in Michigan that is not on some form of synchronization program that stems from aspects of Dr. Pursley's research," said Rachelle Bennecke, veterinarian and owner of Stoney Hills Veterinary Service, which works predominantly with large dairies in Michigan.

"When I started practicing 20 years ago, a farm was doing fantastically well if they were getting a 15% fertility rate. Now, it seems like if you're not bumping up close to 30%, then you're falling behind. As veterinarians and as an industry, I think we're always trying to be more efficient, and Dr. Pursley's work has helped us accomplish many of those goals."

Some Michigan dairy farms have seen a 50% increase in first-AI success rates since implementing fertility methods Pursley and his team developed. It's that direct impact that motivates Pursley and endears him and his work to dairy farmers across the state.

"I have a lot of respect for Richard, personally," said co-owner of Nobis Dairy Farms, Ken Nobis, whose family-farm near St. John, Michigan, has hosted MSU research tours since the 1970s. "I think he's doing very practical research that is a benefit to every farm in Michigan today. His discoveries on timed breeding and the methods developed from those carry so many benefits for the animals and for the operators."

Ovsynch fertility protocol

Pursley's research program began with a simple question: How can dairy farmers better monitor and control cows to enhance first insemination fertility rates?

Previously, farmers spent time and resources monitoring herds for cows showing signs of heat, allowing many variables to impact the success of insemination. Pursley, along with collaborator Milo C. Wiltbank, published a series of findings on what they would call the Ovsynch Protocol.

Ovsynch enabled AI to be performed at specific times allowing farmers and veterinarians to synchronize programs. Ovsynch is now the basis for premier AI management tools and has been adapted to the changing needs of producers.

"Pregnancy rates from first AI increased significantly once these protocols became commonly implemented," Pursley said. "When fertility rates increase, dairy producers can keep a higher percentage of their herd pregnant, making both the cows and the farm more productive and efficient."

Cows that become pregnant on first insemination tend to also have better health outcomes, Pursley said.

"Cows that become pregnant late in lactation have lower fertility rates after calving and more health problems at the time of calving," he said.

"From MMPA's point of view, as well as mine, the dairy industry in Michigan is at the forefront of the dairy industry in the United States, and we are fortunate that we have a world-class university with researchers that have been forward-thinking in their research, yet responsive to the issues our industry has faced," Nobis said.

"We have a really good group of producers in this state who are pretty open-minded and willing to try new things and find more efficient ways to produce milk. The University has listened to the producers' needs, and I think that's critically important."

Reducing pregnancy loss in cows

More recently, Pursley's research has focused on reducing pregnancy loss in cows.

"Once dairy cows have a calf, fertility drops 50%," Pursley said. "We want to understand where and why these losses occur and what methods can be implemented to prevent future loss. If we can solve that problem, it would be as big of an efficiency increase for dairy farms as the fertility programs."

Through a USDA Agriculture and Food Research Initiative (AFRI) grant, Pursley's research team discovered a specific protein that increases in pregnant cows at approximately 21-22 days following AI. The release of this protein correlates with the time of conception.

This discovery provides a roadmap and potential tool for Pursley to develop methods to prevent pregnancy losses.

The timeframe between insemination and when the embryo bonds to the uterus for a heifer (21-22 days) was consistent in Pursley's findings, however that period varied (19-27 days) for dairy cows who already had a calf. Pursley's team found that any embryo attachment after 21 days has a significant chance of loss.

He has tested ways to enhance pregnancy mechanisms and develop fertility management programs to increase the number of cows that have embryos 21-22 days after insemination.

Much of Pursley's interaction with dairy producers comes through relationships with state veterinarians, who serve as "boots on the ground" for researchers to better understand

producer problems.

Through MSU Extension, Pursley helps train and support the state's veterinarians and animal caretakers on updated fertility management programs and additional programming to enhance herd reproductive efficiency.

"I've worked with hundreds of veterinarians over the last 20 years to understand what they need from the researchers, because they are the ones out on the farm actually doing pregnancy diagnosis and treatment. They're the ones helping producers run their reproductive programs," he said. "Collaborating with veterinarians is key for keeping our research up-to-date with what is happening on our dairy farms."

It's a two-way street of scientific inspiration for Bennecke, who graduated from MSU's College of Veterinary Medicine in 2003.

"The discoveries and research Dr. Pursley's team brings forward pushes us as veterinarians to be more efficient with our programs and to get better pregnancy outcomes and better long-term reproductive strategies in both our heifer herds and our cow herds," Bennecke said.

**CME daily spot market mixed
Barrel cheese soars to record highs**

The CME spot market was mixed this week. Butter and 40-lb block Cheddar dropped, while nonfat dry milk edged slightly lower. The gainers were dry whey up fractionally and 500-lb barrel cheese soaring to a new record high above the \$2.60/lb mark. This surge in barrel cheese value helped current month futures move a dime per hundredweight (cwt) higher, but the weakness on block cheddar softened up the October through January contracts. The rest of the board was unevenly steady -- given the fact that new pricing formulas are waiting in the wings for potential implementation early next year.

If the USDA Recommended Decision is finalized as proposed, then barrel cheese prices will be out of the Class III formula, and higher make allowances will take about \$1.00 per cwt, off the Class III price.

The weekly National Dairy Product Sales Report (NDPSR) for week ending Sept. 14 reflects the momentum of all products being higher last week before weakness set in early this week on the butter, block cheddar and NFDM.

On the daily CME spot market, 40-lb Cheddar blocks

traded at \$2.2450/lb on Wed., Sept. 18 -- down 7 cents from a week ago with 11 loads changing hands across five trading days.

The 500-lb barrel cheese price was pegged at \$2.6250/lb, setting a new record high, up a whopping 24 cents from the previous Wednesday with 13 loads changing hands in five days -- reflecting the continued strong price gains for bulk Mozzarella on the Global Dairy Trade (GDT) biweekly internet auction again Tuesday. That GDT Mozzarella price sits at \$2.42/lb -- precisely in between this week's block and barrel prices on the U.S. CME market call.

At these levels, both the 40-lb Cheddar and 500-lb barrel cheese are well above the NDPSR for the week ending Sept. 14.

Dry whey gained a half penny on the week at 59 1/2 cents/lb Wed., Sept. 18, with 8 loads trading. The weekly NDPSR remains a solid 7 cents per pound behind the spot market clearing price, barely into the 50s at 52 cents/lb

for week ending Sept. 14. The NDPSR is the price plugged into the Class III formula when the four weeks in each month are weighted.

On the Class IV side, spot butter declined a whopping 17 cents per pound with 20 loads trading, pegged at \$3.00/lb Wed., Sept. 18 -- mirroring the sagging butter and milkfat prices on the GDT.

In the face of a whopping 32 loads of Grade A nonfat dry milk traded on the CME this week -- more than half of which was dumped into last week's escalating market rally on Sept. 12 -- the spot price edged just a penny lower, at \$1.3850/lb Wed., Sept. 18.

**Class III milk futures take
some shine off last week's rally**

Class III milk futures took some of the shine off last week's big price rally, and the net average for the next 12-months (Sept24-Aug25) eased 14 cents lower at \$20.64 per hundredweight on the close Wed., Sept. 18. The Class IV milk futures averaged \$21.76 for the next 12 months, down 13 cents from the previous Wednesday.

**Global Dairy Trade index up 0.8%,
Bulk Mozzarella adds more big gains,
Bulk Cheddar, SMP, WMP also higher**

The GDT biweekly internet auction was mixed Tues., Sept. 17 with the all-product index gaining nearly 1% compared with two weeks ago. Cheddar, Mozzarella, skim milk powder and whole milk powder were the market gainers, while butter and milkfat declined.

The Mozzarella index was the big winner -- yet again -- continuing its run higher, up 4.5% at \$2.43/lb on Sept. 17 vs. \$2.33/lb on Sept. 3 and \$2.18 on Aug. 20. The Cheddar index (up 2.9%) hit \$2.01/lb.

GDT index gains were also achieved Sept. 17 on these products as follows: Skim milk powder (up 2.2%) averaging \$1.27/lb; Whole milk powder up 1.5%, averaging \$1.56/lb; and Lactose up 3.5%, at 41 cents/lb

Lower indexes were charted for Butter down 1.7% at \$2.97/lb; and Anhydrous milkfat powder (AMF) down 1.2% averaging \$3.28/lb.

Oct. Class I mover jumps \$1.57 to \$23.17

The October advance Class I base price mover was announced at \$23.17 for a gain of \$1.57 per cwt. over the September Class I mover, and up \$3.70 per cwt. year over year, according to USDA's Sept. 18 advance price announcement. The rapid rise in cheese prices the first two weeks of September compared with steady to modestly higher nonfat dry milk and butter brought Class III and IV advance skim pricing factors closer together than they've been in months. For October, the average-of method was a positive due the narrowing, with Class III pricing factors above Class IV for the first time since early 2023. The higher-of Class I mover would have been \$22.67/lb.

Class I markets up \$0.15-0.38/cwt.**

Statistical Uniform Prices (SUP) were higher again in August across all Federal Orders. The Class III markets flipped the script with the largest advance occurring in the Upper Midwest (up 82 cents) and the smallest advance (15 cents) in the Class I market of Order 6 in Florida. PPDs were positive but smaller in all multiple component pricing Federal Orders, indicating the rise in Class III relative to other classes last month. 30-day H5N1 drops to 12 in 3 states:

*Colorado drops off the 30-day map,
beating back its high of 64 cases this summer;
California on the rise as case numbers reach 10*

As of Sept. 18, 2024, the current number of confirmed cases of H5N1 in dairy cows within the past 30 days decreased to 12 herds in just 3 states. Of these, 10 are in California, which saw its first case Aug. 30th and most recent detection on Sept. 13th.

Colorado finally beat back its hot-spot status that reached a high of 64 herds at one point. That state has not had any new detections in more than 30 days, so it's off the 30-day list. Idaho and Michigan remain on the 30-day map with one detection each on Sept. 12th and 9th, respectively.

Cumulatively, since the start of the outbreak, there have been 208 detections in 14 states: Colorado (64), Idaho (32), Michigan (29), Texas (26), Iowa (13), Minnesota (9), New Mexico (9), South Dakota (7), Kansas (4), California (3), Oklahoma (2), Wyoming (1), Ohio (1), and North Carolina (1).

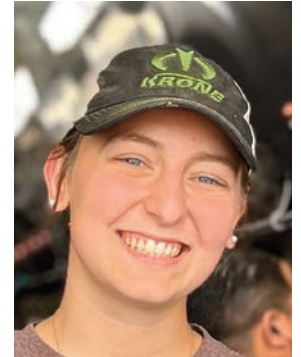

Internships offer knowledge, networking, skill development

For a college student, internships offer a wide variety of opportunities – allowing introduction to new skills, developing important contacts and helping to determine career goals.

Penn State Animal Science majors have taken advantage of a wide variety of internships, from working on dairy farms to working in agribusinesses. It is a positive situation for both the student and the employer.

According to Rachel Cloninger, Animal Science Advising Coordinator, about 80 percent of students in the Department take advantage of the opportunity, with some contacts being made through the Animal Science Department and some through coordination with the Center for Dairy Excellence.

Cloninger said, “We are grateful for the many producers and other businesses that inform us of openings for students, providing an opportunity for learning and networking.”

For **Emma McLaughlin**, junior animal science major, the summer offered an industry-related job. Working for Sullivan Supply at their warehouse in Hillsboro, Ohio, she had the opportunity to live away from her home in State College, and hold her first non-farm job. She packed and drove gooseneck trailers to shows and fairs throughout Ohio, and traveled to several other states. She said, “I have had lots of networking opportunities, improved my marketing techniques and worked with a variety of people who have various livestock experience.”

She said her experience with showing dairy cattle brought diversity to the team she worked with at Sullivan Supply.

Her Penn State experience includes being a social and community service co-chair for the Dairy Science Club and secretary for the Block and Bridle Club. She lives and works at the Penn State dairy barns and serves as a teaching assistant for Dr. Robert Mikesell.

Emory Bewley, senior in animal science, Gibson, PA, worked for Cargill as their Dairy Sales and Nutrition Intern in Western Wisconsin, a position that helped her identify that the nutrition field is something she is passionate about and

that she finds interesting to pursue as a career. Having grown up on her grandparents’ dairy farm, JoSan Farms in Susquehanna County, she was very involved in show ring activities as well as 4-H and the Junior Holstein Association. While the summer internship focused on dairy nutrition, she also worked on a variety of projects that exposed her to other parts of the dairy industry.

Heavily involved at Penn State, she was chair of the Spring Dairy Exposition, worked for the Nittany Lion Fall Classic and helped pack cheese boxes for the annual Cheesebox sale.

Faith Wolfe, Centre Hall, worked as a Traditional Branch intern at Horizon Farm Credit out of their Reedsville office. Shadowing various departments, she learned about accounting, lending, credit and appraisal and worked on a variety of special projects. Having grown up on a dairy farm, she has been very active in the agriculture industry, including being a member of FFA and 4-H, with community and livestock projects.

Wolfe, a sophomore at Penn State, said she hasn’t settled on her complete career goals, adding, “I aspire to give back, in one way or another, to the industry that has provided me with lessons, relationships and opportunities throughout my life.”

At Penn State, she is involved in both the Dairy Science Club and the Ag Student Council. She fondly remembers as a child “flipping” through Farmshine and wearing the Farmshine t-shirt!!!

Madison Benfer, Curryville, also worked for Horizon Farm Credit, as an appraisal intern based out of Martinsburg. In addition to shadowing appraisers from other offices, she created an excel sheet that contained poultry integrator contract base pay information, compiled information from sales databases, helped create different department information sheets with other interns and created employee story videos to be used both internally and externally. She is a senior majoring in animal science with a business emphasis and minoring in agribusiness management.

Benfer grew up raising Holstein heifers and showing them at local and state shows, as well as raising dairy beef and pigs.

She said, “I found the internship very helpful with my professional development by working on resume building, interviewing skills and building my LinkedIn profile.” She said

she was grateful for the many networking opportunities making connections with great people in the Ag Lending world –contacts she knows will be helpful when she enters the workforce upon graduation.

Alex Coursen’s internship was coordinated through the Dairy Excellence Foundation, and was an on-farm internship at Hemdale Farms, Seneca Castle, NY, a dairy that milks about 1500 cows and with 26 robots. He worked with herd managers and helped treat cows, and completed several projects including making new fresh cow protocols and footbath measurements and concentrations. A sophomore in animal science, he said, “I have always been interested in agriculture and knew that this was the path I wanted to take.”

Hoping to pursue a career in dairy farming and production, this internship helped him gain experiences in a new location and on a much larger scale than his home farm that uses a robotic system for 60 dairy cows. He said, “Gaining the relationships and getting to learn how they take care of their animals, while maintaining such a large operation, has been very valuable.”

Coursen grew up in Spring Mills, PA, and was in 4-H for six years, showing both pigs and dairy cows. At Penn State he is a member of the Dairy Science Club and Alpha Zeta fraternity.

Adria Russell, Alexandria, worked as an intern through the Dairy Excellence Foundation at Kulp Family Dairy in Martinsburg. While shadowing all of the employees who dealt with animals, she learned how to diagnose and treat sick cows, artificially inseminate cows and learned about using ultrasound. She also filled in for employees on vacation. She said her internship helped her consider becoming a dairy manager as a career after her positive experience and knowledge.

Russell grew up on a dairy farm in Alexandria, PA, with both sides of her family having dairy backgrounds, so her plans for the future have always been to remain in the dairy industry.

Also active at Penn State, she is part of the Dairy Science Club, the Meat Science Club, Alpha Zeta fraternity, Disciple-Makers Christian Fellowship and the judging team.

She expressed gratitude for the internship narrowing down future career choices. “I learned a lot about myself, and found the I do not like working in independent environments for extended periods of time, and I really like solving problems.”

“The internships are designed to give students a full understanding of what it takes to run a successful dairy operation, and provides dairy farms with the chance to mentor the next generation of dairy. Interns are making direct impacts at the farm level and building connections within agriculture that will last a lifetime.”

Pennsylvania Lactating Dairy Cow Health Monitoring Program: Protect Your Herd from Avian Influenza: With the recent confirmation of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in California dairy herds, 14 states have been confirmed to have HPAI in dairy herds as of September 6, 2024. Although HPAI has not been identified in Pennsylvania dairy herds, it is important to protect our herds and our operations by remaining vigilant and using the best biosecurity possible. To help you protect your herd and your operation, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) is offering free testing of milk through the Pennsylvania Lactating Dairy Cow Health Monitoring Program.

sources, and provides information that will help us understand and better control the spread of the disease.

When a producer joins the program, milk samples from the bulk tank(s) or in-line system are collected and tested weekly at one of the three PADLS laboratories at no cost to the producer. Collection tubes and shipping labels will be provided at no cost to the producer. During the third consecutive week of milk testing, if a producer has animals in the sick pen, milk samples from the sick pen shall be provided along with the regular sample. After three consecutive weeks of negative test results, the herd will be placed in a "Monitored Dairy Herd" status. Producers will then be asked to submit weekly milk samples to ensure their herd or herds remain free of HPAI.

If HPAI is detected in your herd, your premises will be placed under quarantine. With a permit from PDA, you may continue to ship milk. To obtain a permit, you must have an approved biosecurity plan for your premises. A FARM biosecurity plan or Secure Milk Supply biosecurity plan can be submitted for consideration for a PDA permit. Movement of cattle off the premises will also be allowed under PDA permit. PDA will assist you in maintaining continuity of business while reducing the risk of HPAI spread to other premises or animals.

Pennsylvania has many multi-species premises. If there are multiple species of production animals on your premises, treat these areas just as you would separate farms, maintaining separation.

Producer privacy is important to PDA. Details about an affected dairy herd will not be disclosed publicly during the disease investigation and will only be reported at the county level.

Avian influenza was reportedly introduced into a U.S. dairy herd in March 2024 by infected wild birds. Since then, studies have shown that most transmission of the virus has been between lactating dairy cows, due in part to movement of lactating dairy cows between farms, and poor biosecurity practices. HPAI has been confirmed in other livestock, including goats and alpacas, and appears to be easily spread to poultry. Other mammals have also been affected.

Strict biosecurity is the most effective means of preventing the spread of HPAI from one premises to another or between species on one premises. Biosecurity practices should include, at minimum, site-dedicated footwear, clean clothes, and handwashing when entering animal areas; cleaning and disinfecting equipment that leaves the farm; and isolating sick animals. Limiting traffic and visitors onto the premises and vehicle and equipment movement on the farm are also critical to protecting your operation and other dairy and poultry operations.

Early detection is critical to minimize the spread of the infection to animals and farmworkers. Laboratory testing is necessary to determine whether a herd is infected with HPAI. Milk testing has been a reliable method of identifying HPAI within a herd up to two weeks before the onset of symptoms in lactating cows.

The program provides producers with confidence their herd is not infected with HPAI, provides consumers with confidence the dairy products they consume come from tested and trusted

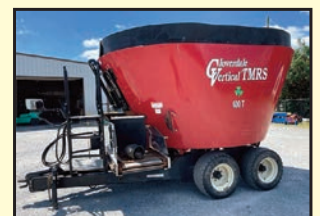
